Ninos Aho's "The New Assyrian" and Our Indifference

Many decades ago, the pen of the great poet and thinker <u>Ninos Aho</u> cited for us a poem titled "Atouraya Khata" (The New Assyrian). His words were those of a true Assyrian nationalist. His message was clear, "*we are not Nestorians, Chaldeans, Jacobites or Presbyterians – we are <u>Assyrians</u>*". He spoke about a revival in the Assyrian thought. He knew his people and his message was clear. He walked in parallel in the footsteps of earlier great minds of Prof. Ashur Yusuf Bet Kharput, <u>Naum Faeq</u> and <u>William Daniel</u> who condemned ignorance, emphasized education and loved Mother Assyria. These great minds told us that ignorance and backwardness are mental construct that must be dismantled.



Ignorance and backwardness make the person think that he, his person and his pride are being attacked whenever he reads something that goes against his own belief or thinking. Additionally, nationalist thinkers teach us that sectarianism is a mental disorder. A sectarian person loses sight of pragmatic and sensible concepts that are behind knowledge, reason and fruitful and constructive dialogue. We are our own enemy, because we have allowed the influence of the church to overshadow our better judgment. Do poets, writers and politicians deserve to be stonewalled and out-casted because of their views on religion, for example? Ignorance and backwardness makes the person vulnerable against the aggression of the enemy and weak in any attempts to defend meaningful values.



We have a better chance to advance the Assyrian cause by learning from Rabi Ninos Aho's <u>The New Assyrian</u>. We will live a better free life by studying Yusuf, Faeq, and Daniel with an open mind, irrespective of their views on faith

or their opinion regarding religion. We have allowed the church to control our lives for a hundred generations and forgot how to be real Assyrians. It is no wonder that we have

remained were we are. It is no wonder that the Kurds have expanded and advanced their cause on our historic lands in northern Iraq (<u>Occupied Assyria</u>). George Orwell once wrote, "*who controls the past controls the future, who controls the present controls the past, perhaps by rediscovering the past we will gain the control of the present and make a better future for all our children*". So honor Ninos Aho, Prof. Ashur Yusuf, Naum Faeq and William Daniel, love and fight for Assyria first and the church next and be courageous enough to say, protect and defend the truth for the truth will set us free.
